IT'S ALMOST HERE...

It's almost here - the most important day of the Christian year. Easter – the day of the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ. It's the day that Jesus defeated death and God said enough of this old religion. I am doing a new thing! But, the resurrection is not just a wonderfully fascinating event that happened 2000 years ago. It is also more than an "end of time" event. It is the promise of God's life available to us both now and forever, a promise that our relationship with God can be more than we ever dreamed or imagined.

Each of the Gospel (*Matthew, Mark, Luke and John*) narratives begins the Easter story with a similar account – it's Sunday morning, the first day of the week, and there is a visit to Jesus' tomb by Mary Magdalene, the stone is removed from the tomb, and there is an appearance of an angel or angels – but after this initial encounter each of the writers goes his own way in recounting the resurrection story. Each of the resurrection stories provides the reader with a different angle on what it means to meet the risen Christ. *Do you remember where you met the risen Christ*?

In John's Gospel Mary is at the tomb weeping for what is gone (John 20: 1-18). Many of us can relate to her tears. We have many reasons to weep. Many of us are facing times of trial or loss and it is hard and it hurts. Jesus calls to Mary and asks her why she weeps? In that moment she could give him a whole list of reasons why she is crying but instead her weeping immediately stops and she realizes that she is once again in the presence of her Lord and it is enough. Take some time to look around. Yes there are hardships and difficulties but there are also signs of God presence, love and mercy with us in the midst of our troubles. We have not been abandoned nor forgotten. Resurrection is something that continues to happen for us today.

In John's Gospel Mary was told that she could not hold on to Jesus. It seems that Jesus is saying "don't keep trying to hold onto me." Many believe it is because Jesus wanted Mary to understand that her faith was not to be anchored in the past. There is more taking place in this story than just a reunion. Instead, it is ultimately about Jesus' destiny, Mary's destiny, and yes even ours. Jesus tells her: "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God" (20:17). The story is still not finished. This was a day of new beginnings for her and for all of us that have come since. The relationship that Jesus has with God is one that we can now have. No longer does Jesus refer to God as his Father but as our Father, no longer does he refer to God as his but also as ours. The intimacy of Jesus' relationship to God now marks our relationship with God and this opens up for us new possibilities and beginnings as children of God.

God's new world continues to break into ours. When we enter into the story something wonderful happens. It becomes our story and as long as we have breath our story continues to unfold. *The same choices are also offered to us that were offered to Mary*. The Savior who called Mary by name is here today and continues to call each of us by name. It is a new day. Are we willing to let go of the past and allow the possibilities of the new day to fill our souls and guide our thoughts and actions as we become the people that God is calling us to be?

This year, may the empty tomb be more than just an annual worship event or tradition we celebrate. May it continue to change us and call us to new life in Christ; a life in which we become life-givers and agents of resurrection in our families, communities and around the world. Pastor Barb

This garden is going to be built by one of our Boy Scouts for his Eagle Award. He is going to build 6 big boxes filled with dirt that we can grow vegetables in. The vegetables that are grown will be picked & taken to the Food Larder. Have you ever planted a seed and watched a sprout come up from the ground and turn into a plant? Mom said that there is a big paper drawing of the church property. On the drawing are 6 little green boxes that show where the garden is going to be built. Mom said that when the weather turns warmer she will take me outside to see the garden. I can't wait. Do you know where the garden is going to be? Can you find the big drawing *in the church?* I'm going to go and see where the garden is going to be planted. Can you find me on the drawing? If you see the office lady, she will give you a pack of seeds to plant in your garden or in paper cups that you can put on your windowsill.

COMMUNITY GARDEN

In the coming weeks, you will be seeing construction activity on some of the open ground adjoining the Family Life Center. One of the Boy Scouts from our own Troop #133, Alec L'Amoreaux, has selected as his Eagle Scout Project, the construction of six raised 4 X 8 foot beds to be used for raising vegetables, which will ultimately be donated to the New Britain Food Larder. At this point, the planning for the gardens is being addressed by Greg Ehrenzeller and Bob Jack.

Both Greg and Bob are relatively new to Chalfont UMC, so you may not recognize them by name. However, they will be needing help, come spring and summer for the planting, cultivating, weeding, watering, harvesting and other tasks related to the gardens. It begins with Palm/Passion Sunday on March 24 where we celebrate and remember Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem at both the 9:30 and 11:00 worship services. Palms will be distributed.

On Thursday March 28 (known as Maundy Thursday) we join Jesus as he meets with his disciples in the Upper Room to celebrate Passover. It is from this meal, Jesus' last supper that the sacrament of Holy Communion was first experienced. Join us at 7:30 pm, Thursday (in the Family Life Center) as we hear from 7 people who will speak of their experiences with Jesus during the last week of his life. We will also share together in Holy Communion.

Friday March 29th we will gather as a community (with other churches in the area) here at Chalfont at 7:30 pm (in the Sanctuary) to remember once again Jesus' last night on earth and reflect on his death on the cross. Along with the reading of the Passion we will also have music presented by a special ensemble and the community choir (if you'd like to sing please come at 7:00 for practice).
