On the Mend: Healing What Ails Us

Tentative Sermon Schedule

Are you sick and tired of being sick and tired? Are you ready to be "on the mend?" Beginning Sunday September 2 we will work to uncover the wounds that are holding us back from living our best lives. Using the book of Mark we will explore the many stories and teachings of Jesus that speak of healing and wholeness. Join us as we move out of our old ways of being into new possibilities.

September 2 - "Healing Intentions" (Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23) Service is outside in the courtyard; Holy Communion

Hurting others or being hurt by others seems an inevitable part of life. In our scripture for this week, those concerned with 'the law' (*the correct way to do things*) are admonished by Jesus. The only way to be undefiled, Jesus says, is to know wholeness on the inside, and not just focus on appearing 'pure' on the outside. Our intention becomes love when are healed from the inside-out.

September 9 - "Healing Inhibitions" (Mark 7:24-37) Reception of New Members

As we explore the ways in which we need to be healed, this Sunday we consider the things we are closed off to, and the things about which we stay silent. Shutting things out or holding things in can both be dangerous to our health. Healing can mean the freedom to face difficult things. Jesus says to us, "be opened!"

September 16 - "Healing Fear" (Mark 8:27-38) Holy Communion

Jesus begins to speak about his death to the disciples and it stirs up such fear in Peter that the chews Jesus out! Jesus returns the favor and tries to give his followers another perspective: Sure, it is risky to live the Gospel-way, but what is the risk of NOT doing this? How do we heal our fear of losing the things of this world so that we can truly live?"

September 23 - "Healing Pride" (Mark 9:30-37)

The pride of being number one often comes at the cost of trampling others. Jesus turns the definition of being 'first' upside-down: it is by serving others that we are lifted up and made whole. What relief and healing could come by letting go of the need to be right, to be first or to 'win?'"

September 30 - "Healing Divisions" (Mark 9:38-50)

In the scripture this Sunday, Jesus' disciples are concerned about who is part of the 'in crowd' and who isn't. Jesus says, '*Come on! Whoever is not against us is for us!*' And then he goes on claiming that the worst thing you can do is to be a stumbling block to someone else... even and especially if they are not up to your standards! Are we creating healing wholeness or division?"

CHANGES TO THE WORSHIP SCHEDULE

As most of you are aware we discontinued the 11:00 worship service for July and August. Unfortunate circumstances led to this decision. Beginning in September we will have communion on the first and third Sundays of the month. (11:00 had communion weekly!) We have also installed a screen which allows us to project the service; it also provides us with more options for song choices. A few members of the praise team will join us at 9:30 (as they are able) and will help with the music.

We ask for your prayers as the Leadership Board and Worship Committee discern the best way for us to move forward in the coming months.

SUNDAY SCHOOL - FALL 2018

When there are changes to the worship schedule - it follows that there will be changes to the Sunday School program. The 11:00 service had a pre-school class and one for "older" young people. The 9:30 service has had one class encompassing all ages of elementary school.

The teachers and Pastor Barb got together to come up with a plan for the coming year. Children of All ages will meet *(after the opening music)* in the room across from the Nursery. There they will watch the video together. The pre-school children will remain in that room. *A NEW Sunday School area is being created in the Family Life Center for the other children*.

Sue Cody and Laurie Warren will be responsible for the Pre-school class. Marcia Weikert, Janet Boylan and Louise Peardon will be responsible for the new class. They intend to work with different ages in different ways so that the classes will be friendly to any child (of any age) that comes to their class. This is a big experiment, and we hope that the parents of our children will encourage us by sending us their children.

October 7 - "Parched Places" (Isaiah 58:1-12) **The Rev. Jane McCarthy preaches** (no communion)

October 14 - "Healing Hold-Outs" (Mark 10:17-31) **Students receive Bibles**

"What is your 'hold-out?' The rich man could agree to all kinds of things to 'get in good' with God, but in the end, he loved his possessions more than anything. The scripture says that Jesus looked at him and loved him. He saw into the rich man's heart and could see what was holding him back from true living in the reign of God. A healing wholeness comes with knowing that whatever we hold dear is what will, in the end, hold us."

October 21 - "Healing Power" (Mark 10:35-45) Holy Communion

To follow Jesus is to find power in the opposite of what most 'rulers' say makes you important. To be a tyrant is to claim a false power based on a deep fear. To claim a healing power is to find strength in humility."

October 28 - "Healing Vision" (Mark 10:46-52) Series Conclusion

"We come to the last week of our series on healing. Like the people in the scripture stores we have encountered, we have heard Jesus point the way toward a more whole and rewarding way of living when we confront the wounds from within. We are 'on the mend!' This last story of healing offers the idea that when we ask Jesus for in-sight, we can expect results. What insight have we gained in this journey of healing?"
